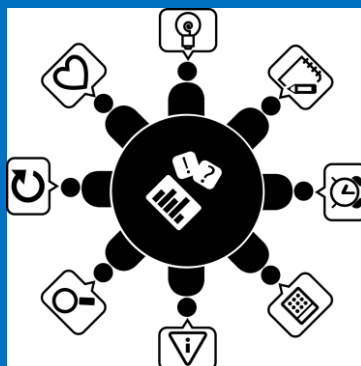

All the activities of the Athens SLE meeting will be held at the [School of Philosophy](#), University Campus, National and Kapodistrian University of Athens in the district of Zografou. The campus is located away from the city noise, yet is easy to reach.

There will be a welcome reception (included in the registration fee), a guided walking tour in Athens' historical city centre (included in the registration fee) and a conference dinner and party (not included in the conference fee). On Friday afternoon and on Saturday, there will be a number of activities to choose from, including excursions to the Acropolis Museum, Cape Sounion and the Temple of Poseidon, Argolis [Mycenae, Nafplio and Epidaurus], and Delphi, a Corinth Canal crossing combined with swimming and lunch, and a one-day cruise to Hydra, Poros and Aegina (these activities are not included in the registration fee).

Job description for SLE Treasurer:

- Responsibilities of the SLE Treasurer include:
 - Membership administration, including the ‘master list’ of members, and fee collection;
 - The SLE bank accounts (now with ING Bank);
 - All financial aspects of the annual conference (including the budget in coordination with the Local Organizers, refunds for plenaryists, etc.);
 - Business relations with third parties (invoices, receipts, etc.);
 - Annual financial report and annual budget.

- Potential applicants should bear in mind that the SLE is officially registered as a non-profit organization with the Dutch Chamber of Commerce. Therefore, it may be convenient to have the Netherlands as the country of residence. However, candidates with other countries of residence are also strongly encouraged to apply.

Job description for Editor-in-Chief of *Folia Linguistica*:

- The journal welcomes work from various theoretical perspectives, but contributions should be directed towards a general linguistic audience.
- *Folia Linguistica* publishes 2 issues per year, each about 300 pages long.
- The Editor-in-Chief is supported by two Associate Editors, as well as an Editorial Board, which is actively involved in the first selection of submissions.
- Responsibilities of the editor include:
 - Appointing an Editorial Board;
 - Creating and maintaining the journal’s guidelines;
 - Organization of the review of manuscripts;
 - Coordination with De Gruyter;
 - Taking care of special issues, in collaboration with the *Folia Linguistica Historica* editor;
 - Ensuring that manuscripts are submitted to peer review and language polishing;
 - Ensuring timely and orderly publication.

- The editor serves for a period of three years, and may be re-elected for one term.

The Linguistics of Deep Learning: ChatGPT and Large Language Models

Willem Zuidema, Associate Professor in Natural Language Processing, Explainable AI and Cognitive Modelling at the Institute for Logic, Language and Computation of the University of Amsterdam.

Abstract

Large Language Models, such as those underlying ChatGPT, have shown the world how far deep learning for natural language processing has advanced. How do these models work, and to what extent have they really discovered the underlying regularities of natural languages? I will briefly discuss the architecture and training regimes of these models, and ways to probe their capabilities. I will argue that the many differences with how humans learn and use language do not mean that LLMs are irrelevant for linguistics and cognitive science; on the contrary: they offer new opportunities, new risks, and new perspectives on old dilemmas.
