SLE and armed conflicts

To address concerns regarding the inclusion of members from regions affected by conflict, we would like to reaffirm that SLE was established as an organisation promoting free and open scientific exchange across borders. Our mission is to provide a platform for discussing linguistics regardless of national origin or political circumstances. Accordingly, SLE does not take steps to exclude members based on nationality or institutional affiliation.

During SLE conferences, we adhere to the policies of the local organising institution and relevant European regulations concerning scientific cooperation with countries involved in armed conflicts or regarded as endangering peace. In practice, this may mean that institutional affiliations will not always be displayed on the conference website or in any official materials. The same principles apply to the conferral of the best presentation and poster awards.

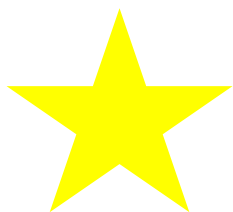

CALL FOR GENERAL SESSION PAPERS AND POSTERS ABSTRACTS:

Abstracts are submitted to EasyChair via the [SLE Members’ Area](#). Please keep in mind that SLE is a members’ association run by and for members. Hence, submitters have to be SLE members to submit an abstract. For SLE membership, please click [here](#). Abstracts submitted by non-members will not be considered. The deadline for all abstracts is 15 January 2026. Notification of acceptance will be given by 31 March 2026.

Abstracts should clearly state the research questions, approach, method, data and (expected) results. They should not contain the names of the presenters, nor their affiliations or addresses, or any other information that could reveal their authorship. They should not exceed 500 words (including examples, excluding references). Abstracts should have the same title as the entry submitted via EasyChair.

Presentations will last 20 minutes, allowing 5 min. for discussion and 5 min. for speaker and room changes.

At SLE conferences there are **PRIZES** for the following categories (see Award winners 2025, p. 3):

- best oral presentation by a PhD student,
- best oral presentation by a postdoc, and
- best poster.

SLE needs YOU – Become a reviewer (PC member)

As mentioned on p. 2, the SLE 2025 participants very much appreciated the high quality of the conference presentations. But to make sure that we selected the most promising abstracts, many people worked hard, and some people worked incredibly hard: 7 reviewers got about 30 abstracts to review on their plate, and some of these people were already involved in other parts of the organization of the annual meeting. The only reason they reviewed so many abstracts was because we missed reviewers.

As a rule, the Scientific Committee does not allocate more than 20 abstracts per member of the Programme Committee (PC); ideally each PC member evaluates fewer than 15 abstracts. This means that with 700 submissions (we had slightly more the last years), we need 140 reviewers to keep it under 15 for everyone. However, as some PC members do not agree to review more than 5 and some others withdraw last minute, we need 200 to 210 reviewers to keep the evaluation process manageable. As we write this newsletter, we have 96 reviewers who have accepted the invitation to EasyChair and have selected their topics...

So, to all members with a doctoral degree: we need you to keep the organisation of our annual meetings healthy! Please take your responsibility and volunteer as a reviewer – please register via [this form](#).

Online Autumn lecture

This year's Autumn lecture will take place on Thursday **27 November at 5 pm CET**. As announced in July, it will be a joint lecture by Leena Kolehmainen (University of Helsinki), Philipp Krämer (Vrije Universiteit Brussel) and Ulrike Vogl (Universiteit Gent). Please find their abstract below.

Closing doors: Universities restructuring their language training programs

Across Europe, universities have been scaling back or closing their language programmes. This trend has far-reaching consequences for students, researchers, societies and international collaboration. In our presentation, we will introduce our ongoing research project, which aims to map these developments, understand where and why they are happening and assess their impact on diversity in language education.

In our talk, we will report the preliminary findings of our questionnaire survey. Through this survey, we gathered insights from staff at numerous European higher education institutions. Their responses provide valuable information about the reasons behind closures, the strategies universities use to cope with them, and their effect on language learning, teaching, and research.

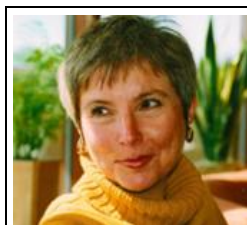

Application:

- a document proving the status of the applicant
- a short CV (max. 1 page, Calibri 11)
- a research project proposal including the aims, scope and relevance of the project (max. 2 pages, Calibri 11)
- motivation letter that describes how the funding will be used and how it will help advance the project – a budget proposal (for a total of €2,000) (max. 1 page, Calibri 11)

The application will be peer reviewed for scientific merit by the Award Committee members.

A written financial report will need to be submitted upon the completion of the grant by the end of the year.

Since our mission is to provide a platform for discussing linguistics regardless of national origin or political circumstances, SLE does not take steps to exclude applications of members based on the latter’s nationality or institutional affiliation. However, in order to address concerns regarding the applications of members from regions affected by armed conflict, the EC of SLE may occasionally require from members who will be allocated research grants that institutional affiliations will not be displayed in any official materials.

New descriptions of objectives

The EC has worked on updating the descriptions of the SLE's journals, and has agreed on the following formulation:

Folia Linguistica and *Folia Linguistica Historica* are the peer-reviewed journals of the Societas Linguistica Europaea (SLE). Each volume consists of two issues of *Folia Linguistica*, one issue of *Folia Linguistica Historica*, and one Special Issue.

Folia Linguistica is dedicated to advancing research in general linguistics, with a particular emphasis on the synchronic study of language. The journal provides a platform for theoretical, cross-linguistic, and descriptive research that explores linguistic structures and their functions across the world's languages, as well as the use of language in social, cognitive, and communicative contexts. Even when focusing on individual languages and/or on specific phenomena within a single language, papers are expected to be framed within more general approaches to human language and communication and be thus of interest for a broader linguistic community.

While *Folia Linguistica* embraces a broad coverage of research on core areas of linguistic inquiry, it does not consider submissions that primarily address Second Language Acquisition, Artificial Intelligence applications, or psychological and neurophysiological experimentation on language processing. Authors pursuing these topics are encouraged to submit their papers to more specialized journals.

Folia Linguistica Historica is exclusively devoted to empirically based diachronic linguistics of all language families, from various theoretical perspectives. Papers should be directed towards a general linguistic audience, offering a contribution to our understanding of language change and to methodological aspects in the field of diachronic linguistics.

Since the editorial staff is managing a very high number of articles focused on specific language subfamilies, and in order to ensure a more balanced representation of the spectrum of languages covered by Folia Linguistica, it is at the discretion of the editorial team to desk-reject any submission that would lead to an overrepresentation of a language and its varieties.

Vacancy

SLE is looking for an Editor-in-Chief of *Folia Linguistica Historica*

The current Editor, Maria Napoli, will step down at the end of August 2026. To ensure a smooth transition from one editorial office to the next, the SLE is looking to appoint a new editor by 1 March 2026. Maria Napoli and the new Editor will then prepare the 2026 issue of *Folia Linguistica Historica* together.

Job description for Editor-in-Chief of *Folia Linguistica Historica*:

The journal welcomes work from various theoretical perspectives with a specific focus on diachronic linguistics.

- *Folia Linguistica Historica* publishes one issue per year, about 300 pages long.
- The Editor-in-Chief is supported by one or two Associate Editors, as well as an Editorial Board, which is actively involved in the first selection of submissions.
- Responsibilities of the editor include:
 - o Appointing an Editorial Board;
 - o Creating and maintaining the journal's guidelines;
 - o Organization of the review of manuscripts;
 - o Coordination with De Gruyter Mouton;
 - o Taking care of special issues, in collaboration with the *Folia Linguistica* Editor;
 - o Ensuring that manuscripts are submitted to peer review and language polishing;
 - o Ensuring timely and orderly publication;
 - o Participating in the SLE Executive Committee.
- The editor serves for a period of three years and may be re-elected for one term.

Put the CV and motivation letter together in one document that bears your name. The Nominating Committee will make a decision before 15 February 2026. The official election will ensue at the Business Meeting of the SLE 2026 conference in Osnabrück.

PROPOSALS SHOULD CONTAIN:

- A description of the research topic, including a brief *status quaestionis*;
- The research questions to be addressed;
- A list of prospective contributors + titles of papers + abstracts (300 to 500 words);
- A short account of how the proposed contributions address the research questions/research topic.

SOME FURTHER PARTICULARS:

- Maximum length: 250 pages (average word count per page is 350).
- The Special Issue should comprise an introduction by the guest editors.
- Guest editors can be (co-)author of one article.
- Contributions to Special Issues will be subject to the same reviewing procedure as regular submissions, that is, blind peer-review by two reviewers external to the issue. The guest editors are responsible for the selection of peer reviewers.
- The Special Issue will be published in the second half of 2027.
